The deadline for narratives is looming so what do you do? You GRIN! And you get to work! Congratulations to our Palomar clubs for finishing your narratives and statistics and filing them electronically again this year. Our District officers also wrote narratives and turned in their hours.

At our Dropbox appointment five days later, we proudly posted our 67 narratives, 11 statistics, and 5 affiliate data forms. We're so proud of our clubs and the fantastic, ambitious - let me repeat that - fantastic, ambitious, and meaningful projects you reported this year!

Two days after Dropbox, we sent out the judging of the narratives. Our members pitched in and conveyed the scores back to the District by the deadline at the end of February. Now we eagerly await our 65th District Convention on April 25 and the announcement of winners in program categories and club sizes.

Pinwheel Garden at the Convention

April is Prevent Child Abuse Month, and with your help we'll "plant" a Pinwheel Garden at the District Convention April 25 to recognize Alomar's support of Prevent Child Abuse America and their "Pinwheels for Prevention" campaign. Pinwheels are a universal symbol of the childhood innocence we wish for all children, and we're asking you to help make enough pinwheels to fill our garden, which PCA America calls "Growing a Better Tomorrow for All Children, Together."

Photos of the garden will be shared with CFWC, GFWC and the Prevent Child Abuse America organization so lots of colorful pinwheels will be very welcome! We made pinwheels at the September Board of Directors meeting in Julian and learned how fast and easy it is (5 minutes, tops). No engineering skills are needed, just willing hands and a few "ingredients" – 8.5"x8.5" construction paper squares push pins, scissors, and sharpened pencils with erasers. Your grandchildren can help you make pinwheels!

If your club wants to make all the pinwheels in one color as a club "signature," that's great – please let Joye or me know so that other clubs will choose a different color. If you want to make multi-colored ones, please do. You can add your club's name on each one if you wish. Also, if your club would like to contribute to Prevent Child Abuse America, please make a check payable to Palomar District and we'll write one check to forward to PCA America. We made a small donation to them after the September meeting, but another donation would be helpful and very welcome. Thank you!

HOW TO MAKE A PINWHEEL: (Or Google "How to make a pinwheel" for illustrated steps.)

- 1. Lay a construction paper square flat on the table and draw a line diagonally from each corner to the opposite corner.
- 2. Mark the center of the square where the 2 lines cross and punch a small hole through it with the pencil point.
- 3. Cut along each line, stopping about 1" from the hole in the center.
- 4. Use the pin to punch a hole in the top left corner of each of the 4 vanes. No 2 holes should be next to each other.
- 5. Pick up a vane at a punched corner and carefully curve it over to the center hole; secure it with the pin.
- 6. Repeat with the other 3 vanes.
- 7. When all 4 vanes are secured by the pin, carefully lift the pinwheel without letting a vane unfurl.
- 8. Lay the pencil flat on the table and carefully push the point of the pin into the side of the eraser.
- 9. The pinwheel is complete and ready to go! Pick it up near the pencil point and let it catch the wind!

PROJECT IDEAS:

Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised (RONR) and Meetings

We are all familiar with meetings! If you meet on a regular schedule, that should be in your Bylaws; for example, "First Wednesday of the month, September through June." A Standing Rule should fix the place and time of your meetings.

Business not completed at the end of a meeting may be carried over to the next regular meeting as "Unfinished Business." If planning to consider that business beyond the next regular meeting, RONR suggests referring the topic back to the committee for a future report. Saving anything beyond the next meeting is discouraged.

Special Meeting: A special meeting is called when something arises between regular meetings requiring action, or if a session is needed for particular matters. Special meetings can only be called if authorized by the bylaws or the assembly. This authorization should state by whom the meeting may be called and how much notice must be given beforehand. Generally, the only business at a special meeting should be that for which it was called. RONR specifies how to determine notice: Unless otherwise stated in bylaws, the number of days is computed by counting all calendar days, excluding the day of the meeting, but including the day the notice was sent.

Adjourned Meeting: This is a continuation of the previous regular or special meeting. It is scheduled for a particular time and place by the assembly's "adjourning until" that time and place. This allows a club to complete its work at a convenient time before the next regular meeting. This is accomplished by moving to "fix the time to

which to adjourn" or to "adjourn until the specified time." The adjourned meeting resumes at the point where the order of business was interrupted, except that the minutes of the preceding meeting are read first.




