

# Workshop Opener Ideas



### How to write a newspaper article

<u>Purpose:</u> To inform and entertain the reader. A newspaper article should deliver a story in a way that gives all the information but also engages them. The main aim is to inform so your writing should not be too personal. Maintain a formal style, avoid using 'I' and try to appear objective. You can, however, show your own bias with the clever use of vocabulary and other techniques.

### Structure:

<u>Headline:</u> This should catch the reader's attention (headlines often use alliteration or word-play) and suit the tone of your article (humorous, serious, factual etc.)

Paragraph 1: Introduce the event giving the key information: What, when, who, where

Paragraph 2: Why, how- Give more detail on exactly how the event happened and what the cause was.

<u>Paragraph 3</u>: Include more background details on what happened before the event in order to give your reader a better idea of what led to it.

<u>Paragraph 4:</u> An interview or quotes giving someone's opinion on the event; this could be someone directly related to the story or some sort of respected or expert opinion.

<u>Paragraph 5:</u> Look to the future; what is the impact of this event? What are you predictions for what might happen next?

### **TECHNIQUES:**

### Connectives:

Adding- In addition, furthermore, moreover, what's more, including

Summing up- Overall, in conclusion, ultimately, in the end

Contrasting- But, however, although, nevertheless, on the other hand

### Sentence Starters:

Firstly, Secondly, Shockingly, Disappointingly, Amazingly, Finally etc

### Punctuation:

BRACKETS- To show a comment/extra detail not required for the main sentence e.g. The victim (17 years old) was from South London.

QUESTION MARK- To show a rhetorical question, used to engage the reader e.g. Will the games live up to all the hype and expectation?

SEMI-COLON- To link two separate sentences which follow from each other (can be used instead of an adding connective) e.g. The tickets were £200; many young fans simply couldn't afford to go.

COLON- To signify a list e.g. Fan's favourite events were: the long jump, 100 metre sprint, pole vault.

### Vocabulary: Avoid boring words try to be adventurous!

### Other journalistic techniques

- A- Alliteration
- F- Facts/Figurative language (similes, metaphors etc)
- O- Opinion
- R-Repetition/rhetorical questions
- E-Exaggeration/emotive language (vocab that gets an emotional reaction from the reader)
- S-Statistics
- T- Triples (a list of three different adjectives used for effect)

Remember, your editor will have to check your work, and they won't like it if they find lots of errors!

### Life of a Club Report

### I. CLUB LEVEL

- a. Do Projects
- b. Collect Hours
- c. Form a Report Committee
  - Brainstorm to think of all projects the club has done for the calendar year (01.01.2022 to 12.31.2022)
  - ii. Sort projects to specific categories
  - iii. Assign report writing
- d. Write Narrative Reports
  - i. Remember the judging criteria
  - ii. Remember the 7 C's of Report Writing
  - iii. Submit reports to 1st V.P./Dean
- Complete Statistical Reports (These numbers should be consistent with individual reports.
- f. Submit all reports to District Dean no later than January 20th.

### II. DISTRICT LEVEL

- Dean collects reports from all clubs, and sends copy to District President, CFWC 1<sup>st</sup> V.P./Dean and Area "D" V.P.
- b. Divides Reports among respective District Chairs
- Chairs have the reports judged by outside judges, if no Chair, then District Dean has them judged.
- District President is informed of award winners, and prepares certificates.
- The District Dean uploads all reports to the CFWC Dropbox no later than February 15<sup>th</sup>
- f. District Awards are awarded at the De Aza District Convention

### III. CFWC LEVEL

- a. State Chairs pull reports from Dropbox and have the reports judged.
- Award winners are announced at CFWC Convention.
- c. Only Creativity winners from each category are submitted to GFWC

### IV. GFWC LEVEL

- International Chairs have the Reports judged
- b. Award winners are announced at GFWC Convention





### The Seven C's of Report writing

### 1. Complete

Using topic sentences, and support/evidence, have only one main idea in each sentence and one idea in each paragraph.

### 3. Concise

Delete unnecessary words, trite phrases, and redundancies.

### 5. Courteous

Watch the tone, positive vs.
negative construction, tact,
demeaning or patronizing
language, sexist or other
offensive terminology,
inappropriate humor,
accusatory tone, terse
wording, and arrogant
phrasing when writing,

### 7. Correct

Make sure your writing is mechanically correct with regard to spelling, grammar, usage, punctuation, and format.

### 2. Coherent

Organize your writing well. Your sentences should flow and not"jar" the reader.

### 4. Concrete

Using active sentences vs. passive. Avoid abstract words.

### 6. Clear

Construct clear, unambiguous sentences. Make sure your subjects and verbs agree and pronoun referents are clear. Also, ensure that your writing is free of jargon & acronyms.

# In addition to the Seven "C"s of Report Writing on the following page, your report should reflect the following:

- What was your goal? Why was the project done?
- Who did the project benefit?
- Were your goals met?
- What was the process? What steps did you take?
- How original is your project?
- · What marketing did you use? Flyer, ad, etc.
- How did you overcome obstacles?
- In the end, was your project successful?
- How much did the project cost, and how much did it earn?
- Was there club participation?
- Was there community participation?
- Did you partner with another group?
- What did you learn to do differently next time?

### Some Report Rules:

- Write in the First Person
- No smaller than 11 font
- No more than three pages
- · No photographs on the report
- Write our full Club and District names
- · Leave some white space around the margins
- Even though most reports can fit in more than one category, they can only be used once

### Strong Suggestions:

- Use Spellcheck
- Use Grammarly
- · Ask a friend to proof-read
- Read your reports out loud and if they don't make sense to you, they will not make sense to anyone else.

### DESCRIBE YOUR CLUB

In 1909, a small group of energetic, community and service-oriented women met and founded the GFWC Woman's Club of Maryvale. With only 12 members, the club was chartered as a CFWC/GFWC and incorporated in 1910. The community sits in the center of Southwest County with a population of approximately 18,000. The Club's membership is currently 89 women with a continued commitment to improve the education, and cultural life of the community while growing the leadership skills of its members.

### DESCRIBE CURRENT SITUATION:

It is estimated that, worldwide, a child is born every 3 minutes with a cleft — about one in 500-750 births.

Operation Smile is a non-profit organization that provides safe cleft palate surgery to children worldwide at no charge. Volunteer surgeons and nurses volunteer to perform surgeries and to train local medical staff to carry out this life-changing work. Without this surgery, there is a risk that nine out of ten children with this condition could die before late adolescence.

WHAT WAS THE NEED: Operation Smile officials indicated that child sized, hospital gowns are in short supply and continue to be in great demand.

### WHAT DID THE CLUB DO?

- a) The Club's International Outreach Committee used materials that would later be used to make gowns were used to decorated tables at the general meeting as a way to bring awareness to the project and to identify materials needed to fulfill the making of gowns.
- b) Club members donated gift cards, cash and many yards of material in patterns that would be suitable for a child.
- c) Several workshops were conducted for members to attend and make the hospital gowns. Using the patterns provided by Operation Smile committee members measured, cut, sewed and ironed a total of 58 hospital gowns which were then boxed and shipped to the Operation Smile headquarters in Virginia.

### WAS THIS PROJECT A SUCCESS? (it's OK to have an unsuccessful project)

The International Outreach Committee were pleased with the collective generosity of club members and the committee members who completed the hospital gowns.

WOULD YOU DO THE PROJECT AGAIN? Due to the success of this project the committee is planning on making more hospital gowns next year and increasing the number that are made.

In October 2018 we voted to change our name from the Montclair-Ontario Jr. Women's Club to the Women's Club of Montclair. We realized that most of our projects were in Montclair, and our members were older and the "Juniors" designation didn't describe us. We have remained federated.

Per the 2020 census census Montclair has a population of 37,865 people. Montclair children attend schools in the Ontario-Montclair School District, which includes five elementary and two middle schools. There is one High School servicing Montclair in the Chaffey Joint Union School District. Montclair covers 5.2 square miles; the majority of residents are Hispanic, 71.1%, average median age is 30 years, average income \$62,000 and 73% have a high school education.

In October 2019 one of our members died after a 6 month battle with cervical cancer at the young age of 48. This tragic event put our community and club in a serious depression. She was a super active woman with a geniune love of life, a constant giver of time and energy to families, childen, and senior citizens. We will miss her caring smile, and attitutude that anything is possible, "lets make it work" was her mantra. She had been recently reelected for a 2<sup>nd</sup> 4-year term as a Montclair City Councilwoman. At thiks point her daughter joined our club to continue her Mom's caring involvement in the community. Her daughter was appointed to serve as councilwoman until the November 2020 election which she ran unapposed. And in November 2022 she ran and won a 4-year position on the Council.

We currently have 7 members; historically we have always been a small club. 3 of our members work full-time, 3 work part-time, and 1 member is fully retired, and an active community volunteer for many years. One of our members is the Montclair City Clerk, and our current President. Two of our members are City Councilwomen, one is also the Chamber of Commerce CEO.

Our interests and emphasis has always been working with people building a better community, person by person and project by project. Our success over the years has been possible by partnering with the school districts, other volunteer organizations, and both City governments. Although we are small, we are mighty and enjoy each other's company and are very federated.

### DISTRICT DESCRIPTION:

The Sierra-Cahuenga District is located predominantly in the northern suburb of the city of Los Angeles and its neighboring communities. We have 11 clubs (and 2 affiliate clubs) in our district with a membership of 358 members. Getting everyone together can be a challenge as our district stretches from Mammoth Lakes in the north to Westlake Village in the west – a distance of 315 miles, 4 of our clubs are over 40 miles north of the San Fernando Valley where the rest of the clubs are located. We work on getting all the clubs to attend the annual convention and have had a good turn out in the past, but not all can attend our every other monthly meeting, and with Covid we did not even bother with in person meetings, preferring to do zoom meetings to keep members informed and involved. Our members are diversified in their settings from urban cities to rural areas to the high mountains. Our board works for the betterment of society; the elimination of domestic violence, the preservation of our natural resources, and the encouragement of our students in arts and education. We also contribute to our local and national services and charities, being proud to be part of the greater California and the National Federated Woman's clubs.

Project Title: District Scholarships Hours 160 Donation \$1200 In Kind \$30

The Sierra-Cahuenga District takes great pride in awarding as many scholarships as possible to students in their district. The Scholarship Committee is the District Executive Committee. The Corresponding Secretary serves as chair, sends applications to the clubs and reads all applications received to make certain they have met the criteria. Each of the 14 Clubs may sponsor two students for a District Scholarship to a college, university or vocational school. Selection of the recipients is based on academic achievement, special need and/or all around community involvement. The Chair writes a brief synopsis of each applicant to give to the District Executive Committee along with the applications. The Executive Committee discusses the applications and decides who and how many to honor. Checks are mailed upon receipt of fall enrollment. The Chair also sends out an "I'm Sorry" letter to those not awarded a scholarship and encourages them to please try again next year.

This year we presented two scholarships: \$500 to a continuing college student, and \$700 to a graduating high school senior who had chosen to attend community college. These were the only two applications that we received this year. We hope that next year we will receive more applications and be able to give many more scholarships to deserving students. The extra money that we did not spend this year will be rolled over for next year's applicants.



# State Report Sent to GFWC

The Shafter Woman's Club began in 1915 as The Wednesday Afternoon Club. Over the years, it has continued to be an important organization in the Shafter community. This city of 22,531 in the southern San Joaquin Valley is one of the most vital agricultural areas in California and within the city's borders is a growing Industrial Park with many retail distribution centers. Our forward-thinking city council is using that money wisely, especially in educational opportunities for our students, many of them Hispanic. Our club motto of "Cooperation means Success" reflects the club's involvement in community activities and events to "Ignite our Volunteer Spirit"!

Project Title: White Ribbon Campaign at School Hours 15 Donated inc above In-Kind: \$112.00 Five club members set up a Domestic Violence Awareness Prevention booth at our local high school during lunchtime. Twos girls from our mentoring program joined us to help encourage student to say the White Ribbon pledge. Posters lined the walls behind our booth with thought provoking questions and quotes. Resource information on domestic violence prevention abuse, teen dating abuse, resources to report abuse were available. During the morning announcement student reporters read current statistics on teen dating violence and domestic violence and encouraged everyone to stop by our booth at lunch to take the pledge. At least 170 students took the White Ribbon Pledge "Never to commit, excuse, or stay silent about sexual harassment, sexual assault, or domestic violence against others". Once they recited the pledge, they were given a white ribbon and a piece of candy. Students showed a lot of interest in the issue and wanted to do their part in getting this issue to stop. Some took resources to share with a loved one. The event was inspiring to hear young people so invested in the issue.

The GFWC La Verne-San Dimas Woman's Club celebrated its 8th anniversary in 2024. Our membership has been consistently growing every year, encompassing a diverse ethnicity of enthusiastic, hardworking, kind and giving individuals who come together in the spirit of volunteering. We have a broad appeal since we hold our meetings in the evening to accommodate working members' schedules yet also attract a good mix of ages, stay-athome moms and retirees. Our philanthropic projects have grown substantially to support many organizations, and we were recently honored to receive the Best of La Verne Service Club Award for the third year in a row.

Crossroads is an organization that facilitates re-entry supportive services to women released from prison back into the community. Crossroads understands that women who have been incarcerated for 10-20 years face extraordinary challenges transitioning to the outside world. While at the facility, the women are provided with housing, case management, drug and alcohol counseling, education services that may include getting their GED, tutoring, employment readiness and placement assistance, and life skills which includes money management. While at Crossroads, they live in houses where they share space, take turns cleaning and cooking, and acquire life skills. The GFWC La Verne-San Dimas is proud to provide essential items that make life better for these ladies as they encounter the challenges of their new lives. In-Kind amount represents items donated, Club member participation in this project is essential as it supports stability and community reentry to high-risk demographics. This project also aids in reducing newly released women stressors by facilitation of much needed items including business attire for re-entry to the workforce.

In 2024, the Corralitos Woman's Club was proud to have completed two phases of a significant Clubhouse renovation, consisting of the kitchen and two restrooms The accomplishment was celebrated by all members, and although there were disruptions, the Club did not miss a beat with accomplishing fundraising and meaningful projects. The diverse projects below illustrate the focus and commitment to continuing our tradition of community service and caring.

### Project Title: Mother's Day/Holiday Jewelry Project Hours 60 Donated \$ 0 In Kind \$300

For many years, the Club sponsored a project where members donated gently used costume jewelry, which was curated into sets as small gifts which were brought to local women's shelters. The unwrapped gifts are then presented to the children of shelter residents, who selected a gift(s) for their mothers. In the past, the Club did this prior to Mother's Day, but this year it was expanded to include the holidays. Members of the Riverside Woman's Club came together for a meaningful afternoon dedicated to journal decorating, channeling creativity into a cause close to their hearts. As a result of their efforts, 40 beautifully adorned journals were donated to the Riverside Area Rape Crisis Center, where counselors promote journaling as a powerful tool in the healing journey of survivors of sexual violence. Additionally, club members created journals specifically for children, aiming to help young survivors or witnesses of domestic violence navigate their emotions, reduce anxiety, and overcome fears. This thoughtful initiative reflects the club's commitment to fostering hope and resilience in those facing profound challenges.

The Riverside Woman's Club (RWC) was born in 1896 when eleven audacious women gathered in the cozy parlor of Dr. Sarah Maloy, a local physician, to lay the foundation of what would become the Woman's Club of Riverside. Later renamed the Riverside Woman's Club, we proudly stand as the oldest community service organization in Riverside. Our legacy of trailblazing feats includes the establishment of the Riverside American Red Cross Society, the creation of Riverside's first public library, and the birth of the Riverside Community Players—all sparked by the determination and vision of our early members.

In 2024, we joyfully marked our 128th anniversary of service, as well as the 102nd anniversary of our beloved historic clubhouse. Our modern-day club is a vibrant tapestry of diverse women, united in our mission to enhance the lives of those within our community and beyond. From awarding scholarships and spreading holiday cheer to developmentally disabled adults, to donating to local food banks, and serving dinners to our local firefighters, our efforts are boundless. Additionally, we provide meals to women veterans grappling with PTSD, reflecting our unwavering commitment to making a tangible difference.

One of our heartwarming projects is the Journal Decorating initiative. In just 80 hours, our creative members transformed 40 plain journals into stunning works of art. These journals were lovingly donated to the Riverside Area Rape Crisis Center, where counselors use them as therapeutic tools to aid survivors in their healing journey. We also crafted special journals for children, designed to help young survivors or witnesses of domestic violence express their feelings, alleviate anxiety, and conquer fears. This initiative stands as a testament to our dedication to nurturing hope and resilience in those facing life's toughest challenges.

Through these endeavors, the Riverside Woman's Club continues to honor its enduring "Legacy of Service," celebrating a rich history while forging a brighter future for all.



The Start of 2021 meant we were all still deep in Covid -19 protocols. As a result, we did not have any in-person meetings until The GFWC Convention in August & our first GFWC California Board Meeting in September.

- The first three months of the year the Leadership program had two 45-minute Zoom workshops as part of the State President's Three-Month Chairmen Workshops Program.
   Every chair gave a 45-minute workshop at least once during this period. The intent was to interest our clubs in many of the programs we do or can do. Also, to keep the club women involved in club work at the state level & see that their dues were doing something for them & to show that the Leadership cared about the members.
- The chair continued with her series of 12-page booklets on different areas of leadership. During the 2-year period of this term, she wrote 26 twelve-page booklets for clubs. Some of the 2021 booklets were titled "So now your Club president", "You've been elected Club Dean", "Making You're Mind Up", "Grow as a Leader", "Another look at Leadership", "Leadership after Covid", "Tips from First Ladies", Conflicts of interest & You", "Qualities & Responsibilities for all", Digital Detox", "Gratitude for Leaders" & "Modern Leadership Ideas". The best part of these booklets is that they are still available to every member & are used by clubs as leadership tools in meetings. The booklets are now in the CFWC Dropbox for everyone to read.
- February 2021, we had our first Zoom LEADS program. It was over a two-day period.
  There were 15 speakers on all the subjects a club leader might need, from amenities to
  agendas, to planning & websites. We also had each participant do a selfie taught by our
  team & upload it to our Video Chair, who then made a power point to show at our
  February Zoom State Board meeting. Each participant spoke on the same question. We
  had 12 ladies each from a different district. They were email paperwork from each
  speaker & mailed a package from the chair with GFWC California & GFWC items as a gift.
- The Chair also wrote 15 Quick Byte articles for our version of News & Notes that comes
  out weekly on Monday mornings called Quick Bytes. She wrote about all types of
  leadership issues clubs were facing. From what is the first a President needs to do,
  staying in your lane, picking projects & helping members become new leaders. These
  articles are supposed to be no more than 250 words, short & sweet.
- The chair for the 2022 LEADS asked 21 women to speak at the February 2022 Leads conference starting in September 2021. She worked on the program & getting the speakers all on the same page. It will be a 2-day live presentation.
- At the Live in-person September Board for GFWC California the chair gave a 3-minute report on what LEADS Participant needed to do & what the applications & photos should be.
- Also, at this meeting a Featured Speaker failed to show. This chair used one of her booklets to put on a 20 minute on what were great leaders' traits. It was interactive using the group to help her find out what they thought a great leader was. The group enjoyed the lesson & had fun being included as part of the speech. She received very positive feedback.
