

The NEA Endorses High-Impact Tutoring in Schools, Hope for Student Success

In mid-February, the National Education Association, the nation's largest union, endorsed in-school-day high-impact tutoring. Here's the heart of what they said:

"The research is clear: high-impact tutoring improves student learning. Over the past few years, finding a consensus around the most effective strategies and interventions to address post-COVID learning recovery has largely been elusive. However, there is widespread agreement that high-impact, or high-dosage, tutoring holds tremendous promise. Where it has been properly implemented, high-impact tutoring produces large learning gains for many students, particularly those who have fallen behind academically.

That's the conclusion of an increasing number of researchers, school leaders, and classroom teachers who have seen the practice in action. High-impact tutoring has been shown to be 20 times more effective than standard tutoring models for math and 15 times more effective for reading. Studies demonstrate that the practice increases students' learning by an additional three to 15 months across grade levels. High-impact tutoring has not been enacted in many districts, but it should be."

Succession and Shadowing

Is your club ready to move into the next administration with a succession plan? A succession plan could include a leadership "shadowing" opportunity for key appointed or elected positions.

Why develop a shadowing program?

- Members shadowing a position can make informed decisions about the role and its responsibilities.
- Members develop and hone skills while building confidence.
- The interaction that your shadow has with fellow members or committees builds trust and creates teamwork before stepping into a position.

How to begin?

- 1) Identify your members who are potential successors.
- 2) Sit down with those members to discuss and determine areas of focus.
- 3) Implement your shadowing plan. It can be as simple as asking each member to join you at key leadership meetings to view what and how things are done over a month or two. Or establish a process that includes them in the work for an extended time frame that allows participation in the responsibilities: create agendas, balance accounts, or compose drafts of minutes.
- 4) If you are a leader, make sure your shadow is nearby.

Whatever path is taken, ensure communication stays open. There should be no surprises about time commitments. Make sure that information and support is always available.


With the opportunity to shadow, as your program progresses, you will find members are more comfortable stepping into leadership roles.

"enlighten the
pathway of yourself."

A Little History of ESO Upsilon Chapter

According to GFWC's ESO Handbook, Bertha J. Lacey, a well-known Indiana artist, designed the crest for ESO in the form of a shield, the ancient symbol of protection.

The shield is divided into (billets) or sections. The center section represents the American home, with a pathway leading into the world of achievement. In the top left section, the rising sun stands for enlightenment. The palm leaf in the upper central section of the shield is the symbol of victory through effort. The crescent moon at the upper right denotes enlightenment pursued in the night-time hours of study. The lower left section shows the lyre which is the symbol for fine arts. The wheat in the lower right symbolizes the idea that we reap what we sow. The lower central section shows an open book which represents all knowledge. Below the crest is the torsade bearing the name Epsilon Sigma Omicron. The torsade was originally a wreath of twisted ribbon presented to a crusader when he set out upon a quest. The dove of peace, which crowns the crest, symbolizes aspiration.



Backcountry Quilt Show – June 29 to July 4

Sunday, June 29th until Tuesday, July 4th, daily from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm.

The Backcountry Quilt Show will occur on the main (top) floor of Julian Town Hall, located at the corner of Highway 78/79 and Main Street. The quilt show is open to the public and free of charge.

Each year the Julian Woman's Club presents its Quilt Show to display our town's heritage of quilt making for the enjoyment of quilters and other visitors to Julian. This has been one of our club's signature events for 30 years. Many visitors, young and old, female and male, local and from around the world, attend the show each year. A "Country Store" within the show offers quilts and boutique items for sale, all hand-made and donated by women in the club. Profits from the sale of these items go toward local scholarships.

Unlike "juried" quilt shows, our show is an opportunity for local quilters to exhibit their heirloom quilts. A "viewers' choice" balloting is held and the winner receives a ribbon and bragging rights for the year. The Heritage Quilt Show continues to be a success for the club and an important event in our community.

The last day of the Heritage Quilt Show coincides with the town's Independence Day celebration. At 3:00 pm we pick the winning ticket for an "Opportunity Quilt" made by club members and designed by Eleanor Burns. Raffle tickets are available online, at the Wildflower Show in May, and throughout the Quilt Show.



The raffle quilt is designed and sewn under the direction of Eleanor Burns, and is different each year.
